The season of Easter lasts for fifty days and culminates on Pentecost as described in the book of Acts. Here, the Holy Spirit transcends geographical boundaries to show the true reaches of God's kingdom. This is a great opportunity to think about how diversity fits with our Biblical understanding and especially how we are called to see others as beloved children of God.

The allegorical roots of diversity can be found in the story of Babel (Genesis 11:1-9). In those days, all people spoke the same language and their unity gave them great power. They decided to build a grand tower, so tall it would reach into the heavens. As a consequence, The LORD said,

"Look, they are one people, and they have all one language; and this is only the beginning of what they will do; nothing that they propose will be impossible for them. Come, let us go down, and confuse their language, so that they will not understand one another's speech." So the LORD scattered them abroad from there over the face of all the earth.

This story is helpful in that even the ancients wondered about different tribes, beliefs, and customs. Yet, the Bible is also clear that we should show compassion, hospitality, and justice to those from other lands. Throughout the Old and New Testaments, there are explicit commands to welcome strangers and treat them with kindness. Leviticus 19:33-34 states. When a foreigner resides among you in your land, do not mistreat them. The foreigner residing among you must be treated as your native-born. Love them as yourself, for you were foreigners in Egypt.



It's easy to love those who look like us, think like us, and speak like us. The challenge comes when we are confronted with those who are different. What happened on the day of Pentecost was a reversing of Babel. The Holy Spirit descended upon the disciples as tongues of fire, enabling them to speak in various languages. This event unified people from different nations and cultures, allowing them to understand one another despite their differences. Where Babel brought division, Pentecost brings unity—a powerful symbol of the reconciling work of God, bringing diverse peoples together under the banner of understanding. The reversal at Pentecost highlights God's desire for unity among all people, overcoming our self-imposed lines of division. This year, we will

celebrate Pentecost on May 19 th. Let's work toward a more just and compassionate world where differences are celebrated and where all people are held with dignity. Don't forget to wear the color red in celebration of God's mighty spirit.

A message from Sister LaDonna...

I will soon be traveling to Serbia on a pilgrimage to study Orthodox icons. Our group is only 12 people led by a world renowned iconographer.

In preparation, I've been reading a lot about the meaning of icons. As a Protestant I did not grow up in a worship space with icons, but I am learning to appreciate the mystery and holiness that they portray.

Icons are often called "windows to heaven". The eyes invite you to look into the soul of both the icon and yourself. The icon not only tells a Bible story, it asks you to open your heart and allow God to speak directly to your heart.

The icon expresses incarnation. Jesus and Mary and the apostles and saints were all humans who walked the earth. In an icon we are able to see both the humanity and the holiness of the subjects.

I encourage you to view an Orthodox icon and allow it to speak to your heart. There are many to see online. As with any spiritual practice, experiencing an icon's holiness takes time.

I look forward to sharing more after my trip.

# Decoration Reminder From the Cemetery Board

The Fish Lake Lutheran Cemetery is a special place for many people. As your board members, we strive to preserve the natural beauty of the cemetery while providing safe and orderly maintenance of the grounds. With this in mind, we ask everyone to review the rules governing the decoration of gravesites:

Flowers are allowed as follows:

- 1) Fresh cut Flowers placed in containers
- 2) Annual Flowers planted in in-ground planting areas, or in containers on single-leg stands
- 3) Artificial Flowers from May 15th to September 15th in containers on single leg stands.

In all cases, flowers must be located next to the monument or marker. **Glass containers** are not allowed. Trees, shrubs or other plants are not allowed.

All Other Adornments: Including wreaths, crosses and statues are only allowed as follows:

- 1) During the **Memorial Day period** of May 15th through June 15th, and following interments
- 2) Wreaths placed during the Christmas season of November 15th through January 15<sup>th</sup>
- 3) Government issued veterans markers (Bronze Star)

In accordance with state and national veterans cemeteries requirements, we request that flags on bronze stars and gravesites be displayed only during the Memorial Day period.

Toys, balloons, stuffed animals, pinwheels, vigil lights, solar powered lights, breakable objects, and similar items are not permitted.

Beginning June 15<sup>th</sup>, any items not in conformance will be removed and placed on the north side of the cemetery storage building for 30 days for pick-up by the owners.

We ask for your understanding and cooperation with these items. If you have any questions or concerns, please contact one of the cemetery board members.

# Fish Lake Scholarship

**Purpose**: To provide financial support for students who are members of Fish Lake Lutheran Church.

**Policy**: Students shall receive an annual financial gift upon meeting membership requirements and completing the scholarship application. Scholarship awards will be made based upon application requirements being met and the balance in the scholarship fund.

## **Student Requirements:**

- 1. Students must be an active member of Fish Lake Lutheran Church for at least two (2) years.
- 2. Students must complete the Fish Lake Scholarship application by May 15.
- 3. Each scholarship recipient must continue to participate in service as follows:
  - a. Technical and undergraduate college: a minimum of 10 hours annually
  - b. Graduate school: a minimum of 10 hours annually, 5 of which are in a leadership rolec. Seminary: Ministry services at minimum of 20 hours per semester in a leadership role.

# Scholarship Awards: (Depending on funds available)

- Technical and undergraduate college up to \$300 annually for four years with a GPA of 2.0 or higher\*
- Graduate school student up to \$500 annually for two years with a GPA of 3.0 or higher\*
- Seminary students up to \$1500 annually (\$750/semester) for four years with a GPA of 3.5 or higher\* \*Part-time students in any category receive half of the scholarship aid offered.

### **HISTORICAL MINUTES**

A Tribute to Our Church By: Hjalmer A Swenson Now for more than a century You've stood upon this hill, A beacon for the country side; A symbol of good will. You'll never know the good you've done By standing here, sometimes alone With open arms to everyone. For all your guiding light has shown. The Pioneers who sought this place A century ago Left deeds here time will not erase But in God's grace still grow. May your bell still peal out its call. Come gather here. Come one, come all. My mission must not ended be.

I'm here unto eternity.

To those sturdy pioneers who laid the foundations upon which the present church is built, we humbly pay our due respects. Surely these early pioneers were a courageous and hardy people to venture into this complete wilderness to hew out their homes and open up fields to make a living from the soil. Their earthly possessions were meager, but they brought their Bibles, "Postilla" Psalm books and their Christian heritage so they could not fail. Had it not been for the perseverance of these early pioneers in retaining this spiritual heritage from their homeland, chances are that this page of history would have been entered as a failure. There were no pioneers anywhere more sturdy and vigorous, nor possessed a larger vision than these first Swedish settlers of the Fish Lake Area.

In order to better focus the date of organization of the Fish Lake Lutheran Church, on February 19, 1867, we should point out that the State of Minnesota was only nine years old and Chisago County was only fifteen years old; (having been organized while Minnesota was still a territory) and it was only two years after the end of the Civil War. Fish Lake Township, as such, was still not in existence (that taking place the following year 1868).

The Chippewa Indians still roamed this area and had their settlements on the shores of the numerous lakes, however they were of a friendly nature and did not cause these early settlers much alarm (although there are some stories told that at times some were scared when they noticed that the Indians were watching them from behind trees and occasionally caught peeking in the windows).

Indians no doubt had roamed this area on their hunting and fishing expeditions, perhaps for several centuries prior to 1867, this is evidenced by Indian artifacts found in fields and on lake shores (as recent as 1966 we know of a flint spear head and arrow heads being found in Fish Lake Township).

In 1878 the chancel was furnished and a church bell weighing 1029 pounds was procured. Now the bell from the temple tower sounded forth jubilantly when the sun sank in the west and the Sabbath was ushered in. It was similar to what they were accustomed to from the land of their fathers when they were there. Sunday morning came and their feelings were similar, and when one entered the church, one's eyes immediately fell on the Christian banner, the Cross with covering over it, there on the altar, and the organ begins to sound forth, the congregation begins to sing, "How beautiful is this house, dear Lord, Thy Temple and Thy Church", etc.

### Call to Order

Council President Michelle Young called the meeting to order at 7:18 p.m.

### **Consent Calendar**

Items on the consent calendar were presented for approval.

The following motion was made by President Young, seconded, and unanimously approved: **CC 24.04.01 Moved:** That consideration for an audit of existing insurance policies be added to New Business.

The following motion was made by Nancy Hoffman, seconded, and unanimously approved: **CC 24.04.02 Moved:** That the council approve the Consent Calendar as presented and amended.

### **Devotion and Opening Prayer**

Jeff Lustig led the council in a devotion about seeking tranquility in God's presence, followed by an opening prayer from Pastor Teleen.

### **Financial Report**

Sister LaDonna Olson presented the financial reports for the period ending March 31, 2024. The council discussed strong giving throughout March and the expenditures resulting from the work on the elevator.

### Pastor's Report

Pastor Teleen expressed her thanks to everyone who took part in a busy Holy Week and joyous Easter celebration. She also discussed the ongoing goal setting project leading to a visit from Anne Gerrietts, a Church Building Consultant, later in the month. Lastly, Pastor Teleen relayed that Tom Anderson has also retired from his custodial role at Fish Lake Lutheran. The custodial position will be reassessed to align with the current and future needs of the church, and she offered thanks to Jeff Lustig and Candy McColley for covering the necessary duties in the interim.

### **Committee Reports**

- •Communications Pastor Teleen had no activity to report.
- •Property and Safety Jeff Lustig summarized completed repairs to the elevator which brought it up to code. He also mentioned other projects in various stages of progress, including replacing an outlet in the kitchen, repurposing the basement altar, and exploring status on the National Historic Register.
- •Social Ministry Pastor Teleen reported donations for the birthday kit drive were strong, and the committee will be sponsoring the 4th Sunday speaker for the month of April.
- Worship and Music Sister LaDonna Olson announced Africa Sunday is scheduled for May 5th.

- •Youth and Family Pastor Teleen announced the upcoming Spaghetti Dinner on April 20th, and the excitement among the youth to bring this event back to our congregation. Youth events for the summer are also taking shape.
- •Evangelism and Stewardship Pastor Teleen had no activity to report.
- •WELCA Michelle Young reported many blanket and reading buddy donations, as well as quilts sent to A Place For You. The group is also planning their annual Memorial Dinner event. Several members are set to attend the Synodical Women's Organization Conference in late April.

### **New Business**

The council discussed several options on how to proceed with custodial duties in light of the recent retirement of both Robin Graham and Tom Anderson. It was agreed that Pastor Teleen should revise the custodial job description with consultation from Jeff Lustig and Candy McColley, who are currently performing the work. Additionally, as Jeff is being paid for his temporary custodial role, it was suggested that Candy also be compensated for her time.

The following motion was made by Floyd Pinotti, seconded, and unanimously approved:

**CC 24.04.03 Moved:** That an Altar Guild stipend of \$50 per week be established out of custodian salary and offered to Candy McColley for her work until a long term solution is reached.

Pastor Teleen encouraged the council to attend the upcoming consultation visit with Anne Gerrietts, and engage in dialogue about our community spaces.

President Young presented an offer for cyber insurance from our current provider. After discussion, the council agreed our electronic systems are very low risk as they contain a minimum of personal or financial data and opted not to pursue the offer. As an alternative, it was suggested to seek out options for free cyber security training for computer-based staff.

The church received an insurance renewal notice with a significant premium increase for the next coverage period. Pastor Teleen recommended evaluating our current policy to confirm our coverage is appropriate for our specific situation and ensure there are no coverage gaps.

#### **Old Business**

President Young encouraged all council members to participate in the goal setting activity throughout the month of April.

Secretary Hoffman reported on conversations with Associated Bank regarding higher yielding account options and suggested opening a money market account. The council discussed the logistics and options involved.

The following motion was made by Lisa Nephew, seconded, and unanimously approved:

**CC 24.04.04 Moved:** To authorize our financial representatives to open a money market account with an initial deposit of \$10,000 from the checking account and another \$70,000 from the savings account at Associated Bank.
