### A New Seat, A New Perspective

Are you the kind of person who has a “usual” spot? Perhaps it’s the same seat at the dinner table, your favorite spot on the couch, or even the same pew in church. If so, you’re in good company!

A recent article from Quartz highlights how this behavior is part of our human nature:

“Usually, territoriality is thought of in terms of aggression and defense, such as when nations or gangs fight, but actually its most common purpose is to keep the peace,” University of Victoria psychology professor Robert Gifford, shared with Quartz. ‘Most of the time, most people claim a space and others tacitly agree to it.’”

This behavior, known as environmental psychology, helps us feel comfortable and less vulnerable in shared spaces. And I get it. We like to sit next to those people who know us best, especially if we have been coming to the same church for many, many years.

While there’s nothing wrong with having a favorite spot, or favorite friends, what if we stepped out of our comfort zones once in a while? This Valentine’s season, in the spirit of love and community, I encourage you to try something new: sit in a different pew during worship or join a new table during coffee time. Cliques can happen anywhere, even in church. And it’s a dangerous habit for congregations to close themselves off from new friends. Let’s not be that kind of church.

Changing routines can be scary but you never know what fresh perspectives or connections you might discover! Sitting in a new space is a simple way to spread kindness, make a “new to you” friend, and remind ourselves of the shared love we have in Christ.

As we take this step, let us remember the words of Paul in Romans 12:10: “Be devoted to one another in love. Honor one another above yourselves.”

Let’s step out of our usual spots, welcome each other with open hearts, and let God guide us to new friendships and deeper fellowship. Who knows? That “new seat” might just become a favorite too!

*A message from Sister LaDonna...*  
Last month I touched on the holiness of waiting. I want to expand on that idea a bit more.

We all are waiting for something. I am waiting for my trip to Arizona to begin. Chris, my son is waiting for a new kidney. With Christmas hardly over, my granddaughters are waiting for their birthdays in April. Perhaps you are waiting for a medical test result or for a new medicine to kick in. Sometimes our waiting is for an answer to our prayer or a clear message from God about a life decision.

Waiting can be difficult. We want our problems solved now. We want our anxiety and pain to be gone. It takes courage to wait for God’s answer and not to simply jump to a quick solution. But there is an inner transformation that can occur with waiting. Our faith can be strengthened. We become aware of what God is doing and we allow new possibilities.

If you have ever baked bread or watched someone bale bread you know how important waiting is. The dough is mixed and kneaded but it also needs to be covered and allowed to rise. If not, the bread will be tough and difficult to chew.

It’s the same with a butterfly. Once it is out of the cocoon it needs to wait for its wings to dry. It needs to practice opening and closing before it is ready to fly.

Eugene Petersen was quoted as saying, “The assumption of spirituality is that *always* God is doing something before I know it. So the task is not to get God to do something I think needs to be done, but to become aware of what God is doing so that I can respond to it and participate and take delight in it”.

Our granddaughter, Hannah, was 22 months old when she was diagnosed with type 1 diabetes. She couldn't even say the word, so she called her disease, "deebies". She is now a very brave and confident eighteen year old. She and her twin sister Brooke will attend Winona University fall of 2025. Hannah has used an insulin pump since she was 3 years old. Now she also uses a Continuous Glucose Monitor. It alarms when her blood glucose goes too low or too high. This alerts not only Hannah but her school nurse, her mother, father and grandmother. Another new feature of her CGM/insulin pump is it automatically adjusts the amount of insulin that she gets according to her continuous blood sugar level. At 18 years old she manages her diet, exercise and her insulin on her own. She has the support of her parents, school nurse and doctor when she needs it. She is looking forward to playing softball this year. Breakthrough T1D is our best hope for finding a cure. It funds more type 1 diabetes research than any other charity worldwide and it's making progress along many promising paths toward better treatments and a cure.

Please pray that a cure is found in Hannah's lifetime. God Bless You

Call to Order Council President Michelle Young called the meeting to order at 7:16p.m.		
Consent Calendar Items on the consent calendar were presented for approval.  The following motion was made by Nancy Hoffman, seconded, and unanimously approved: <b>CC 24.11.01 Moved:</b> That the council approve the previous meeting minutes as presented.		
Devotion and Opening Prayer Michelle Young reflected on perfection from the perspectives of new year’s resolutions versus Christ’s instruction to “be perfect”. Resolutions tend towards the unrealistic or superficial physical qualities, while the Greek term of the New Testament carried a connotation of completeness. Pastor led an opening prayer continuing on this theme.		
Financial Report Sister LaDonna offered estimated financial reports for the period ending December 31, 2024. After months of lagging behind in giving, a generous Advent and Christmas season helped to meet and exceed our budgeted revenues. The congregation is ending the year in a strong financial position.		
Pastor’s Report Pastor Teleen presided over three funeral services and made seven pastoral visits during December. She highlighted the mid-week Advent services, the Children’s worship, and the choir cantata as memorable events. She also thanked Sister LaDonna for her many years as Music Director and organist. January brings a Holy and intentional break in programming to allow for reflection and a return to regular Sunday worship.		
Committee Reports •Communications - a new hearing assistance device was purchased to replace broken equipment.  •Property and Safety - Jeff Lustig reported on the ongoing bid process for tree removal near the front retaining wall. The committee is seeking a new elevator/lift technician.  •Social Ministry - Pastor Teleen reported on the success of the Giving Tree.  •Worship and Music - the new year brings a liturgy change and adjustments to the special music monthly rotation. •Youth and Family - a lock-in for Confirmation ages is coming up in Richfield  •Evangelism and Stewardship - no report •WELCA - no report		

New Business

The council discussed plans and schedule for the upcoming Annual Congregational Meeting (1/26) and budget review meeting (1/19).

Pastor Teleen informed the council that our custodial position will be coming vacant again. Sandy, our current custodian, is seeking a full-time position but will give notice as appropriate. We thank her for her work at Fish Lake Lutheran and wish her the best.

Old Business

Pastor Teleen reported the slate of nominees is filled for the Annual Congregational Meeting ballot.

Nancy Hoffman informed the council that the Endowment Fund team has completed preliminary work and the details are all in place. The fund can be initiated with a minimum opening contribution of \$25,000.

The organist search was on hiatus through the holidays, but will resume in January.

Sister LaDonna again presented a revised draft of the 2025 budget for council review. The balanced budget proposal covers all projected expenses for the coming year and includes a six percent payroll increase for select staff.
